WP1- Database for free subject verb MWEs

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-Grammatical features

- WWSs
- Morphology
- Control / binding relations
- Internal / external modifiers

-Constituents, WWSs and deep syntactic relations

- "free subjects"-> verb agreement
- Word order permutations indicate phrasal constituents

-Detailed examination of the WWSs

- WWS: a set of words in fixed order with no or limited declination freedom
- Any specialized modifiers?
- If the WWS is an NP:, replacement by a clitic (weak personal pronoun), clitic doubling and, whether it can be assigned any reference at all.

-Meaning of the MWE

-Variations

 A MWE may have more than one form eg a small set of different verb heads may be allowed

-Semantic relations among MWEs

- synonymy
- "opposite" meanings
- "semantic pairs": causative-non causative pairs without sharing the same root
- "verb alternations": passive, causativeinchoative alternation

-The corpora

- The DB currently contains ~300 Modern Greek MWEs
- Both grammatical and ungrammatical strings. The grammatical strings are from the (HNC)/Google and the ungrammatical ones are selected on the basis of introspection.
